Juris Doctorate Degree (JD)

The JD program at Monterey College of Law is tailored for community-focused, working professionals seeking a legal education while balancing their work, family, and personal commitments. Designed with flexibility in mind, the program offers on-site or online evening classes, allowing students to attend law school after their regular workday.

Flexibility to Accommodate Professional & Personal Obligations

Students in the JD program will complete a comprehensive curriculum totaling 90 units, including doctrinal, elective, and experiential courses, over the course of four years. The program emphasizes practical legal skills development, providing opportunities for students to engage in moot court, legal clinics, and internships. These hands-on experiences help students develop the real-world legal skills essential for successful legal practice, while also contributing to the community.

1 Contracts I & II

These classes cover enforceable agreements including requirements for the formation of a contract; problems of interpretation, consideration and its equivalent; damages for breach; the statute of frauds; illegality, and rights and liabilities of third parties arising from the contract itself or from assignment of contractual rights or delegation of duties.

2 Criminal Law & Procedure

Topics include substantive criminal law and elements of criminal responsibility; law of crimes against persons; property; and habitation; the theory of criminal responsibility, parties and defenses to crimes. Also covered are the procedures for indictments, arrest, bail, trial sentencing, and appeals.

4 Legal Writing I A & B

Students learn to read cases and statutes, extract rules and elements, synthesize rules and elements, analyze legal problems in IRAC format, and write objective legal analysis in a cogent style using proper prescriptive grammar and punctuation.

5 Legal Skills

This class addresses key skills needed for law school, the bar exam, and the practice of law. Students review keys facts, rule synthesis, analogies and comparisons, analysis and essay writing. This course meets five times in the fall.

6 Professional Responsibility

An examination of the lawyer's obligation to the client and the public. The class examines the professional rules contained in the American Bar Association Model Code and the California Rules of Professional Conduct.

1 Civil Procedure I & II

This course covers the rules of preparing and bringing a civil case to trial. The concepts of formation of a claim (pleadings), pretrial preparation (discovery) and the law and cases governing personal and subject matter jurisdiction and venue are introduced along with summary judgment, interpleader and res judicata.

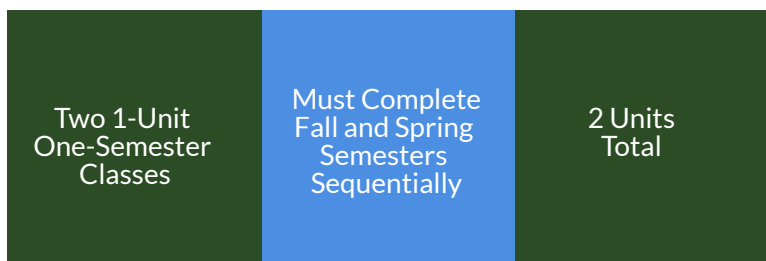

4 Advanced Legal Writing (LWII) A & B

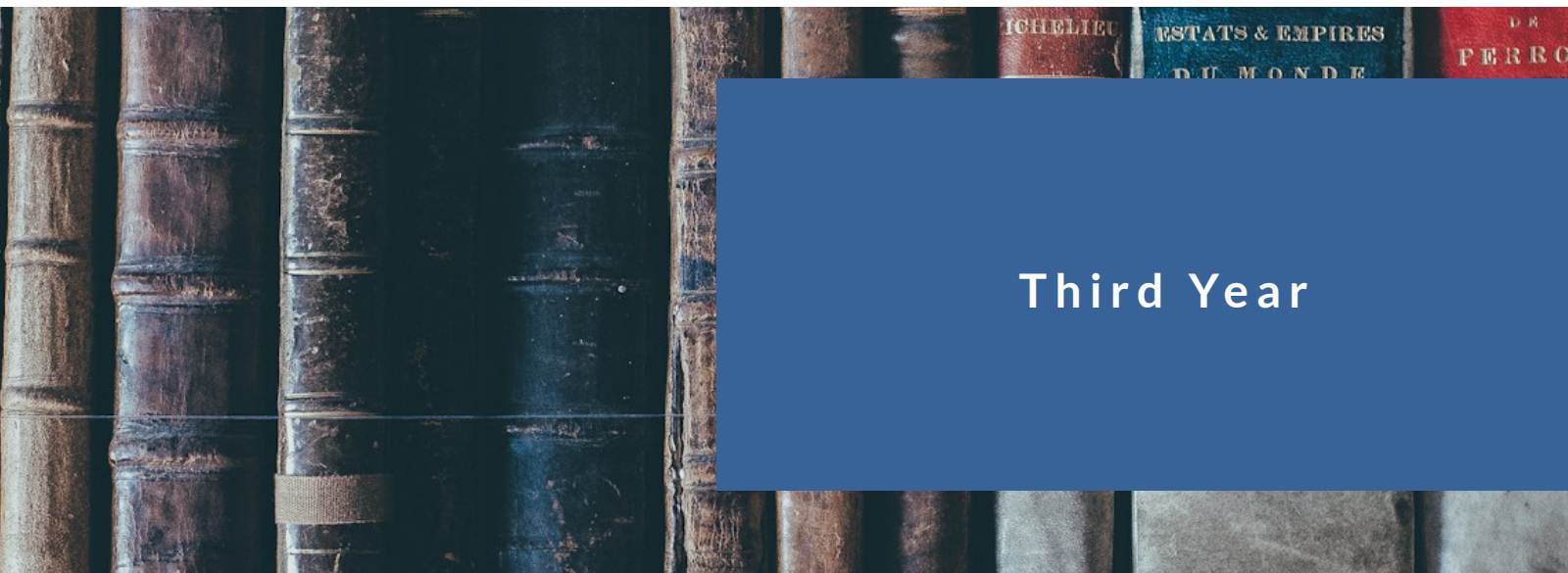
Students learn to extract and synthesize more complex rules from statutes and cases, use the elements of classic persuasion and storytelling, implement motion practice, and write persuasive legal documents using proper prescriptive grammar and punctuation.

5 Appellate Writing (LWIII)

Students learn about appellate practice, implement more complex classic persuasion and storytelling, and engage in oral presentations both in the form of classroom presentations to classmates and oral arguments before judges.

Prerequisites-Crim Law & Procedure, Evidence

1 Constitutional Law I & II

A study of the United States Constitution with an emphasis on the theory and practice of judicial interpretation and review. Topics include the separation of federal powers, the relation of the federal government to the states and specific government powers (tax, treaty, war, and commercial). The course also covers limitations placed on the exercise of governmental power, emphasizing the Bill of Rights, due process and equal protection clauses.

2 Business Law I & II

The law related to the formation and operation of California corporations. Detailed consideration is given to exemption provisions of the Securities Act of 1933, the proxy, anti-fraud and insider trading provisions of the Securities Exchange Act of 1934 and pertinent SEC regulations. Included is an in-depth examination of the practical skills and application of the law.

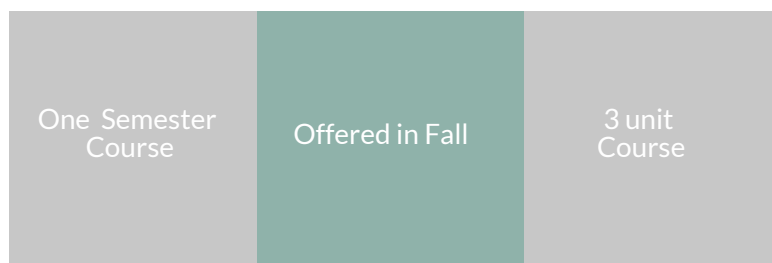

Moot Court Competition gives students an opportunity to study advanced constitutional issues. The semester culminates in a series of hearings, where local judges hear the students' oral arguments on each side of a current civil liberties issue. The public is invited to witness the final round of arguments by four students in front of an appellate judges.

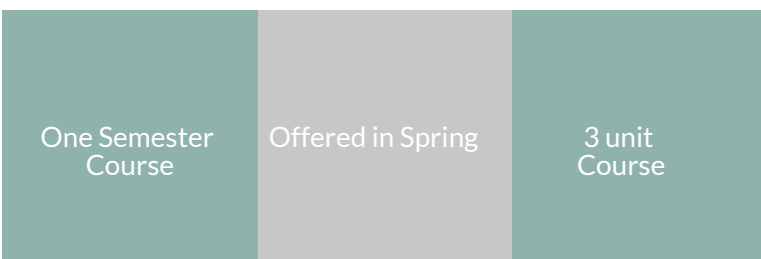

A study of California law regarding the succession of property, wills, and trusts.

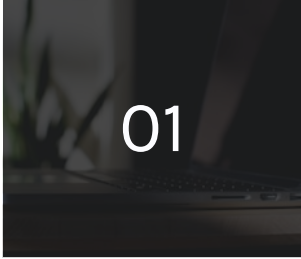

A general survey of equity including the adequacy of legal remedies, injunctions, specific performance, declaratory relief and the jurisdiction and powers of courts of equity. The course also covers the measure of damages in contracts, torts and property, and enforcement of money judgments.

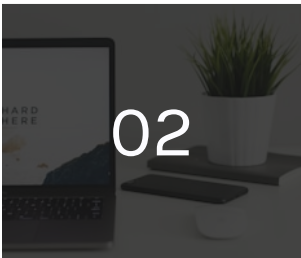

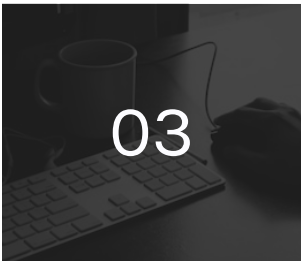

Students can fulfill the clinical studies requirement by participating in the law school's advisory clinics. Eligible third and fourth-year students may also complete approved legal internships.



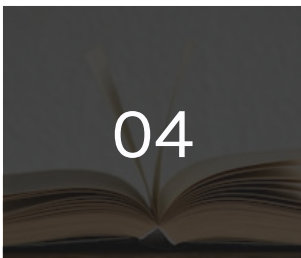

The classes of 2026 & 2027 must complete 16 elective units. The classes of 2028 & 2029 must complete 13 elective units.



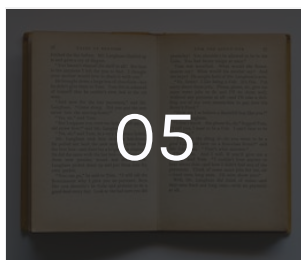
Joint JD/MLS Degree

To earn the Joint JD/MLS Degree, students must successfully complete Gibson Appellate Writing or the MLS Thesis in addition to the JD degree requirements.



Hybrid Online JD

Students completing their degree online must attend an on-site symposium once per year.



Required Bar Preparation Class

The graduating class of 2028 and beyond must complete a 3-unit required bar preparation class in their last year of study.



JD Graduation Checklist

Classes of 2026 & 2027 (first enrolled in 2022 or 2023)

Students in the JD program will complete a 90-unit degree path, including 70 required units, two clinical units, core mediation training, and elective units.

Students must maintain a 70.00 cumulative grade point average (GPA) to maintain good academic standing. In addition, students who do not successfully pass at least 60% of the units in which they are enrolled during a semester will be placed on academic probation.

JD students must successfully complete all graduation requirements within 84 months (7 years) from commencement.

The Law School's curriculum is structured as a part-time program, and students may enroll in up to three bar-tested subjects per semester. Courses follow a required sequence designed for completion over four years, beginning with the fall semester of a student's 1L year and concluding with the spring semester of the 4L year, with graduates typically sitting for the July bar exam. Students who meet the applicable GPA requirements may instead graduate at the conclusion of their 4L fall semester and sit for the February bar exam. Interested students should consult the Student Handbook and their academic advisor to ensure they meet all eligibility and graduation requirements.

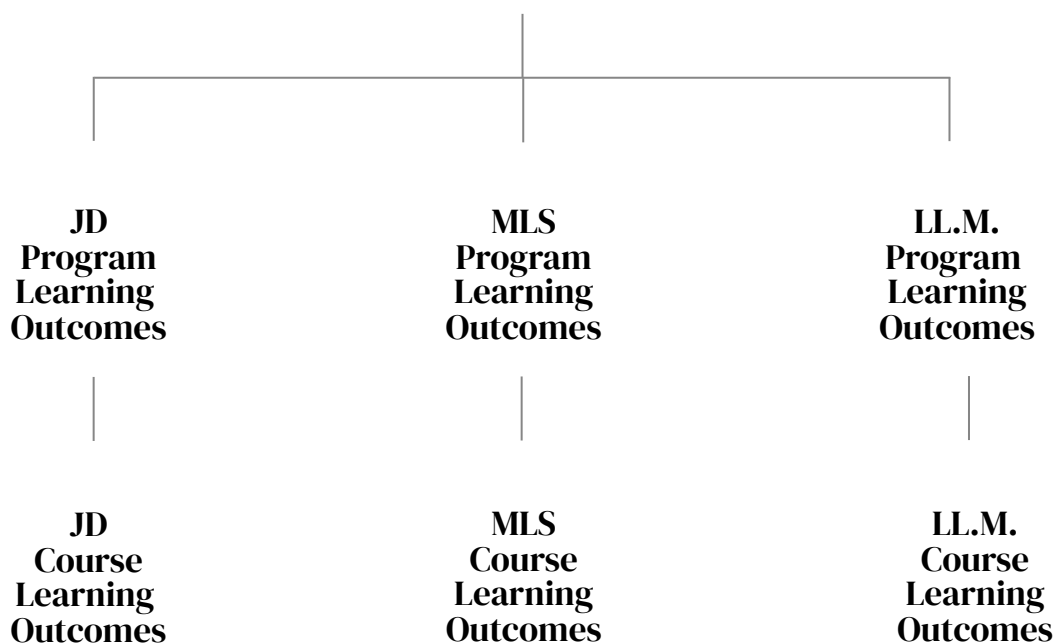
Institutional to Program to Course Learning Outcomes
